



PRINCIPLES OF MARITIME GOVERNANCE IN CAMEROON

Uniqueness of space, common property managed by the State

Unity of action in order to ensure a coherent national AEM policy

Coordination in order to mobilize skills and resources and optimize their use by exploiting their versatility or complementarity

"TOP DOWN" PROCESS

DIFFICULTIES OF COHERENCE BETWEEN NATIONAL ADMINISTRATIONS AND AGENCIES

- 1.Law 02 of April 17, 2000:maritime spacesof the Republic of Cameroon
- 2. <u>Decree 036 of February 04, 2002:</u> creation and organization of the National Navy Forces
- 3. <u>Decree 290 of 1 November 2007:</u> organization and conduct of State Action at Sea and on Inland Waterways

"BOTTOM UP" PROCESS

STEP 1

Implementation of a new inter-agency functional platform

oSignature of MOU between various administrations / agencies responsible for the exercise of State powers at sea

STEP 2

Conception and drafting of the NATIONAL MARITIME STRATEGY


 Voluntary and inclusive consultative process between all the Departments concerned

STEP 3

Implementation of inter-agencies functional transversalities

oImplementation of the coordination, assistance and exchange mechanisms between all Departments / Agencies of the MARITIME GOVERNANCE platform


