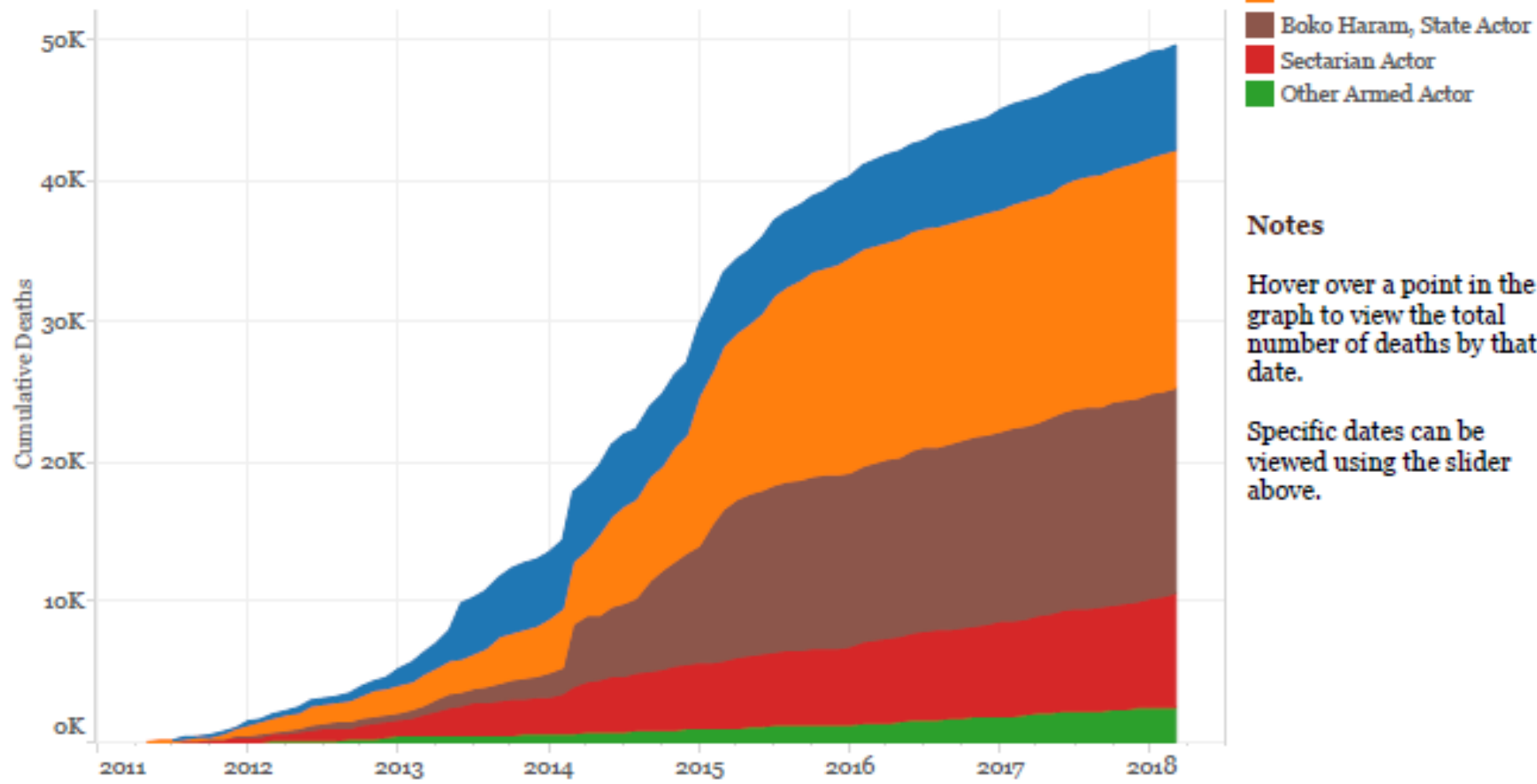




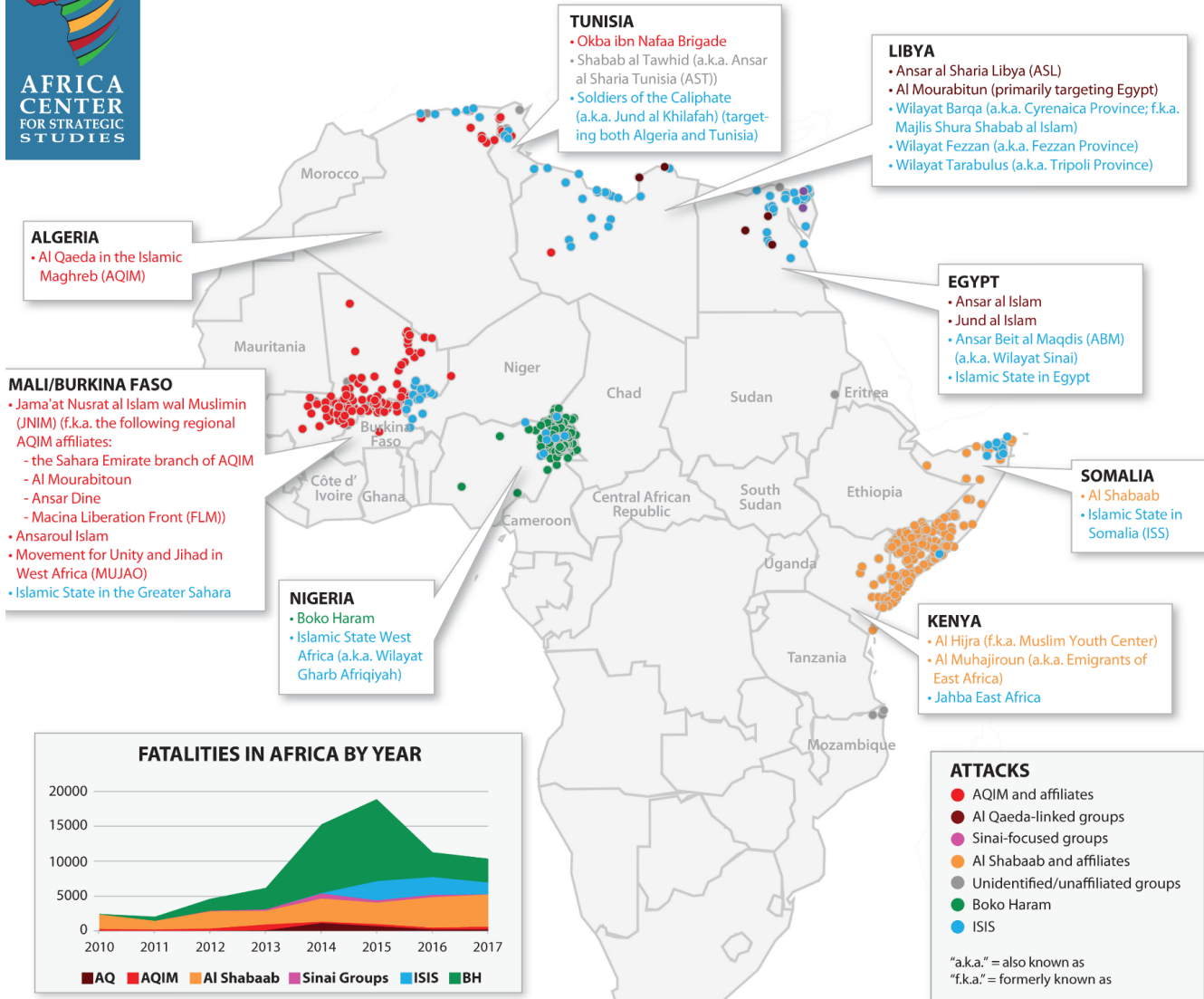


Graph 3: Total Deaths by Perpetrator

AFRICA'S ACTIVE MILITANT ISLAMIST GROUPS



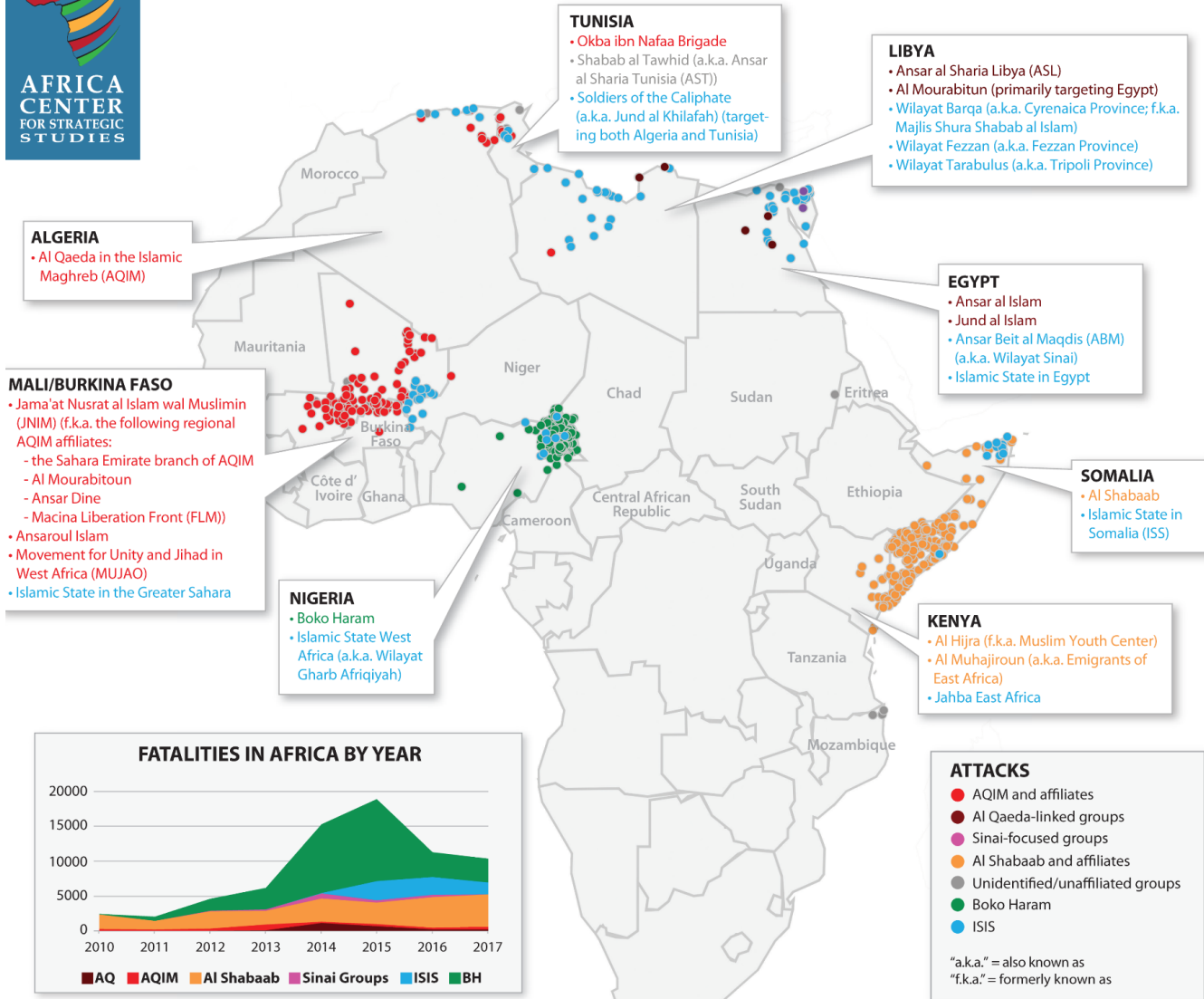
