
Fragility, conflict, and violence: Global and Regional Trends







Africa: Porous borders, violent groups, trafficking




- Main transit point
- Small-arms supply routes
- Small-arms supply routes by air
- Goods, counterfeit, human trafficking, and drugs route
- Human trafficking
- Charcoal and other natural resources
- Major trafficking and trade axis taxed by militants or run by organized crime
- Bottleneck on trafficking routes of strategic importance

AQIM Militia groups fighting over the control of bottlenecks


- Main regional conflicts and areas of reported operations by militia groups




FIGURE 8.2 Sustained Approach to Prevention Stronger partnerships at all levels Early and sustained Prevention integrated into focus on risks LEVEL OF programs and policies VIOLENCE Escalation Recurrence PHASES **Emerging risks** TIME Development Political Relief/humanitarian






Figure 0.2 The Security Sector in the Budget Cycle **Budget preparation and** Setting macrofiscal resource allocation objectives Ministries prepare and negotiate budget, mobilize Determine the resource and allocate resources envelope, levels of against clear strategies, spending and borrowing, policies, and targets. and national development Approval by legislature. objectives. Budget preparation and Security sector resource strategic allocation in the planning security sector Implement Evaluate planned performance activities, **Budget execution** Performance evaluation and report to 5 deploy executive and Implement planned Report on effectiveness personnel legislature activities. Collect revenues and efficiency. Use and release funds to line findings to inform policy ministries in a timely and strategy. Monitor manner. activities and account for expenditures Oversight and reporting Account for expenditures through functional internal control systems. Perform external audit. Annual government process Annual security sector process

Security-Development Nexus in WBG Operations

- **Disarmament, demobilization, and reintegration (DDR)** Financial and technical assistance to demobilize ex-combatants has been provided to more than 25 projects in 16 countries across 5 regions, roughly worth US\$1 billion (mostly Africa focused);
- **De-mining** Although not recently, the Bank does possess a history of financing de-mining operations of roughly US\$200 million in the post-war Balkans;
- Citizen Security About US\$100 million as part of urban upgrading projects in Latin America and the Caribbean.
