

## **Building Institutional Capability: The Big Stuck**



Escaping State Capacity Trap, 1996 - 2013			
•	Pace of Growth		
State Capacity	Negative Growth	<b>Positive Growth</b>	Total
Strong	3	5	8 (8%)
Middle	31 (Time to High Capacity: 8 before the end of century and 4 will take more than 50yrs)	14	45 (44%)
Weak	36 (Time to High Capacity: Forever)	13 (Time to High Capacity: only 3 in <90yrs)	49 (48%)
Total	70 (69%)	32 (31%)	102


## **Escaping Fragility: Trust and Institutions**


## Security Challenges Facing Security Professionals in Africa Corruption
