

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
I-LOCATION AND POTENTIAL OF WILDER ESAON MARITIME ZONE



II-COMMON CHALLENGES AND THREATS TO MARITIME SECURITY IN THE ESA-IO REGION FROM THE PERSPECTIVE OF MIFC



- -Preservation of maritime flows between 03 continents (Europe, Africa, Asia)
- -Securing choke points (Strait of Hormuz, Malacca, Bab El-Mandeb
- -Maintaining the balance of riparian powers
- -Interstate conflicts over maritime possessions
- -Militarization of the maritime space
- -Multi-faceted and transnational threats to maritime security
- -Vast zone of AOI
- -Actions and interventions at sea not coordinated and insufficient
- -ISN not developed
- -Remote surveillance resources such as radar, AIS, VMS, LRIT insufficient or non-existent or not shared at national and regional level

Phase 1

Establishment of the National Maritime Security Committee Structure (Including Sub-Committees)

Phase 2

Development of the National Maritime Security Risk Register

Phase 3

Production of the National Maritime Security Strategy


Practical Framework consisting of expert workshops and tailored consultancy support

- c)Robust Regional ISN linking NMISCs, RMIFC, RCOC
- d)Whole of region approach
- e)Increased regional action
- f) Strong partnerships FoDCoC
- g)Regional training
- h)Facilitation

Individual Progress:

- a)Legal frameworks
- b)Improved marsec governance -NMSC, NMRR and NMSS
- c)More awareness.
- d)Signatory States have focused on enhancing capabilities, particularly in building Coast Guard capabilities.





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
